written a precious introduction to the theory practice and purposes of radio journalism that will be very useful to serious students of the subject this is a very good book the times higher education radio journalism introduces key themes in journalism studies to explore what makes radio reporting distinctive and lay out the claims for radio's critical importance in the news landscape with their extensive experience in radio production and academia authors guy starkey and andrew crisell take readers on a tour through the past present and future of radio broadcasting from the infancy of the bbc in the 1920s up to the prospect of rolling news delivered to mobile telephones grounding each chapter in a survey of scholarly writing on the radio they explore the connections between politics policy and practice inviting critical reflection on who radio professionals are what they do and why putting theory and practice into dialogue this book is the perfect bridge between unreflective production manuals and generalised media theory texts witty and engaging radio journalism provides an essential framework for understanding the continuing relevance of radio journalism as a profession set of practices and arena for critical debate

sound media considers how music recording radio broadcasting and muzak influence people's daily lives and introduces the many and varied creative techniques that have developed in music and journalism throughout the twentieth century lars nyre starts with the contemporary cultures of sound media and works back to the archaic soundscapes of the 1870s the first part of the book devotes five chapters to contemporary digital media and presents the internet the personal computer digital radio news and talk and various types of loudspeaker media muzak djing clubbing and pa systems the second part examines the historical accumulation of techniques and sounds in sound media and presents multitrack music in the 1960s the golden age of radio in the 1950s and back to the 1930s microphone recording of music in the 1930s the experimental phase of wireless radio in the 1910s and 1900s and the invention of the gramophone and phonograph in the late nineteenth century sound media includes a soundtrack on downloadable resources with thirty six examples from broadcasting and music recording in europe and the usa from edith piaf to sarah cox and is richly illustrated with figures timelines and technical drawings

in talking about contemporary media we often use a language of newness applying words like revolution and disruption yet the emergence of new sound media technologies and content from the earliest internet radio broadcasts to the development of algorithmic music services and the origins of podcasting are not a disruption but a continuation of the century long history of radio today s most innovative media makers are reintroducing forms of audio storytelling from radio s past sound streams is the first book to historicize radio internet convergence from the early 90s through the present demonstrating how so called new media represent an evolutionary shift that is nevertheless historically consistent with earlier modes of broadcasting various iterations of internet radio from streaming audio to podcasting are all new radio practices rather than each being a separate new medium radio is any sound media that is purposefully crafted to be heard by an audience rather than a particular set of technologies or textual conventions web based broadcasting combines unique practices and features and ideas from radio history in addition there exists a distinctive conversationality and reflexivity to radio talk including a propensity for personal stories and emotional disclosure that suits networked digital media culture what media convergence has done is extend and intensify radio s logics of connectivity and sharing sonically mediated personal expression intended for public consideration abounds in online media networks sound streams marks a significant contribution to digital media and internet studies its mix of cultural history industry research and genre and formal analysis especially of contemporary audio storytelling will appeal to media scholars radio and podcast practitioners audio journalism students and dedicated podcast fans

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
